A Study of the Holy Spirit Introduction

Pastors, teachers, and Christians as a whole should all desire a more comprehensive knowledge of the person and work of the Holy Spirit. By better understanding all that the third person of the Trinity has for us, the promises of GOD will become within us the power of GOD!

We are living in the Age of the Spirit. The Old Testament period may be called the Age of the Father; the period covered by the Gospels, the Age of the Son; from Pentecost until the second coming of Christ, the Age of the Spirit.

All matters pertaining to the doctrine of the Holy Spirit should, therefore, be of special interest to we who live in this age of special privilege. Yet, how misinformed is the average Christian, concerning matters pertaining to the work of the Holy Spirit in His age. The Christian church today needs to heed Paul's exhortation: "Now concerning spiritual gifts (or, perhaps better, "matters pertaining to the Spirit"), I would not have you ignorant." It may be that the reason why the sin against the Holy Spirit is so grievous, is because it is a sin committed in the light and with the knowledge of the clearest and fullest revelation of the God head. We cannot, therefore, afford to remain insensible of this all-important doctrine.

In many cases, we have developed misconceptions concerning the Holy Spirit, and the role He administers in the Church (His work). These misconceptions have lead to weakness and ineffectiveness in the Christians' life and that of the Church. All of us are able to know with absolute certainty the Biblical facts of His indwelling presence, life-giving and sanctifying power.

It is a revealed fact of Holy Scripture that the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit are one and only one GOD. It is spiritually disastrous to neglect what the Bible reveals about the Holy Spirit and even sadder, not use the power given to us as His earthen vessels. This age of grace, which is in actuality a dispensation of "the ministration of the Spirit" (2 Cor. 3:8) must be given preeminence in understanding and work of the Holy Spirit. GOD forbid that we should live and serve as the Ephesians who had acted ignorantly of the Spirit, and who when brought to the knowledge of the Holy Spirit, declared that they had "not so much as heard whether there be any Holy Ghost" (Acts 19:2).

Many within the Church today are spiritually setting in the upper room waiting, praying longing for the Holy Spirit to move in their lives, speak to their minds, or fulfill the desires of "their" hearts, while He is in their hearts waiting for them to respond to His instructions.

I hope and pray that as you study with me, the Holy Spirit, that we all devotionally, dependently and doctrinally come to a more concise biblical understanding of the Holy Spirit as He works within our lives and Churches.

"A Thankful Heart"

(Hannah's story)

1 Samuel 1 - 2:11

The story of Hannah is one of pain, perseverance and praise. Chapter one opens by giving details of her family situation. Hannah, one of Elkanah's two wives, was his favorite. Hannah was barren, but Peninnnah, his other spouse, had children. The situation in this story is similar to the one in the story of Leah and Rachel, sisters who were married to Jacob. Rachel, the favorite wife, was barren, but the Lord blessed Leah to be fruitful (Genesis 29:31). In both cases, when God saw that one was treated better or loved more than the other, He created a way to make the situation more equitable.

To a Jewish woman, being unable to conceive was seen as a curse from God. Even though Elkanah loved Hannah deeply and gave her double of what he gave Peninnah, it could not fill her empty womb or mend her broken heart. Peninnah was envious of the love Elkanah had for Hannah and would provoke and ridicule her regularly, probably reminding her of her inability to conceive. The enemy has a way of taunting us whenever God has us on hold. If we are not careful, we will become discouraged and begin to believe his lies. Can you imagine how hard it must have been for Hannah to live under the same roof with this woman who desired only to cause her pain?

While in the tabernacle at Shiloh, Hannah decided to stop feeling sorry for herself and take her situation to the only One who was able to turn things around. She began to pray and weep with her whole heart. The Word of God says she was praying within her heart, but her lips were moving. The High Priest Eli mistook her for a drunken woman. She explained that she was not drunk, but was a woman with a sorrowful spirit. After realizing his mistake, Eli told her to go in peace, and he asked God to grant her request.

We should always be careful how we treat others, especially those who may be at a disadvantage, because God has a way of turning things around. Those who are up today may be down tomorrow. Those who are on top may find themselves at the bottom. What others may not see, God sees. In His own time, He can turn things upside down. God remembered Hannah, and she conceived, gave birth to a son and named him Samuel. Samuel's name means asked of God. The pain that Hannah suffered at the hands of her enemy was soon forgotten. Her ability to persevere in the midst of adversity paid off, and her pain was turned into praise.

In chapter two Hannah begins to thank and praise God for her many blessings. She delights in the Lord and worships Him for who He is and for delivering her from the hand of her enemy. She thanked Him for reversing the curse, turning things around and executing judgment on the wicked.

Hannah's story should be an encouragement to anyone who feels empty or barren in a certain area of life and anyone whom God has placed in a holding pattern. The enemy may be using this time to bring doubt, discouragement and fear. Remember, God's timing is always perfect. He has a time set for your breakthrough. He has not forgotten you. Follow Hannah's example by praying past your pain and having a thankful heart. Then God will turn your pain into praise!

1 Corinthians 9:24-27, Hebrews 12:1-2

Each of these athletes has to prepare and condition their bodies for their own race.

The life of a Christian is often compared to running a race. We are more like marathoners than sprinters because we are in it for the long haul. Speed is not as important to a marathoner as endurance. We run with patience and endurance as we keep our eyes focused on the prize. We must discipline ourselves both physically and mentally so we will be able to endure hardships, setbacks, and injuries which are sure to come. Staying focused is of paramount importance while running a race.

As Christians, we've been given our own race to run. We must run the race that has been set before us, not someone else's race. Trying to run someone else's race can cause collision and serious injury to both runners. This requires focus. Great runners always look far ahead, keeping their gaze on the finish line.

I don't know about you, but I'm in this Christian race to win! All of the years of preparation, injuries, setbacks and hardships will pay off one day. I'm grateful to God for the race He's given me to run. I'm content to run my own race and I've learned to stay in my own lane. My eyes are focused on my prize.

Are you in it to win it? Keep your eyes focused on Jesus, who is our Prize.

He could have felt defeated and given up, but he was not one who gave up easily. To the contrary, he did something radical. He climbed up a tree so he could see Jesus as He passed by. After all, this was a chance of a life time. He didn't know if he would ever get that opportunity again.

Zacchaeus didn't realize it at the time, but he was about to receive an unexpected blessing. Soon as Jesus reached the tree Zacchaeus had climbed, he looked up and said to him "Come down, for today, I must stay at your house." Zacchaeus came down without hesitation and joyfully received Jesus. Don't expect everyone to be happy that Jesus has visited you. Sometimes the complainers will be those who say they are seeking Him too. The crowd began to murmur and say about Jesus, "He has gone to be a guest with a man who is a sinner." I'm amazed at the number of people who are eager to point their crooked finger at your past after you've made positive changes. Isn't that the beauty of salvation, that God can transform even the most wretched of sinners? (1 Corinthians 6: 9-11)

It is impossible to have a true encounter with Jesus and remain the same. Zacchaeus was so convicted of his sin that he offered to pay back four times what he had extorted and give to the poor. Jesus said to him, "Today salvation has come to your house."

Is anyone or anything blocking your view of Jesus? Determine in your hearts and minds that you will do whatever is necessary to see the Savior. Like Zacchaeus, you can have a fresh start, and your life will never be the same.

Shout! But, First We March

And the seventh time it happened, when the priests blew the trumpets, that Joshua said to the people: "Shout, for the LORD has given you the city! Joshua 6:16

The story of Joshua and the victory at Jericho is a well-known Bible story. While much is said of the victory shout and the walls falling, few discuss the systematic marching. Examining the faith, order and obedience required for the strange march that resulting in taking Jericho reveals key steps to leading a victorious life.

First, God told Joshua to have courage. (Joshua 1:6-7, 9.) All brave men have a healthy reserve of fear, but no brave man would allow fear to stop him from pursing victory. It takes faith to build courage to move out of our comfort zone and to conquer our fears, but not blind faith that creates uncertainty about possible consequences. God wants us have faith that He is always with us to protect and lead us to success. (Jeremiah 29:11.) When we have courage to follow God's direction in spite of our fear, then God counts us among His faithful servants.

Second, God had specific instructions for the Israelites to follow in order to take Jericho. Things get a little weird here. They had to penetrate the wall to win the battle. Yet, God's plan for tearing down the wall did not include brute force. Instead, God instructed Joshua to have the soldiers march around the wall seven days, followed by seven priest blowing ram's horn trumpets, and other priest carrying the Ark of the Covenant.

God has an order and specific instructions for every mission. Keeping this in mind helps us plan for success. The Ark of the Covenant, or God's presence, was at the center of the Jericho march. God's presence should also be at the center of everything we attempt to do. Priest trumpeted God's praise before the Ark. We too should praise God continually for sending His Holy Spirit comfort and guide us. (John 14:16) Also, things may seem a bit weird when God is directing our path, but God knows what is best. He sees the bigger picture, while we only see our current circumstances. (Isaiah 55:8-9.) So, praise God anyhow. (Psalm 34:1.)

Finally, Joshua obeyed God's instructions to the letter. Effective soldiers are always obedient. My father is a retired Marine. I remember him going to Japan several times after receiving orders from his commanding officers. Even though it meant leaving his family behind, he went.

But, believers struggle with obedience to God's will. Why? Because the kingdom of God is established on obedience to the will of God, and Satan resist God's kingdom on earth. Still, Jesus taught us to pray, "Thy kingdom come, Thy will be done in earth, as it is in heaven." (Matthew 6:10.) If we pray the same, then God will tell us how to march. And, marching by God's orders will break down walls and win battles.

Let's march.

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Your Smile Can Light Up the World!

There is a lovely sign on the wall at the entrance to an elementary school in southern China that says, "Your smile fills our campus with sunshine." I passed this every morning last July when I arrived at 7:45 to teach ESL (English as a Second Language) to 40 eager teachers. What a welcome this was and what a reminder of the power of a smile! Imagine.... this simple facial expression could bring warm light, brightness, and cheerfulness to anyone who saw it. How could I read that and not smile even when it was 90 degrees with equal humidity that early in the day!

Dressing modestly and professionally each day in the heat was a challenge, but one morning (when any clothes seemed like too many clothes) I started grinning at the frown in my mirror and realized I wasn't dressed appropriately without my smile. Putting on that smile was an inexpensive way to change my "look" and disposition, and I deeply wanted to share the caring language of a smile.

Did I really believe the axioms, "Service with a smile" and "Smile, you're on Candid Camera?" In fact, many people each day were watching me, so how could I reflect my deep faith in God and thankfulness for His many blessings if my countenance looked otherwise. The person in my mirror and I had a good talk about that! We decided that there would be no gloom, discouragement, or anxiety emanating from us today through a frown! We knew we had to give away smiles instead so that someone else's day could be brightened. Think about it---doesn't a friendly smile that we receive make us happy? How can we not give someone else that same happiness?

A good reminder is found in the Contemporary English Bible in Proverbs 15:30 which implies that a smile carries the good news that someone cares about you, and this gives strength for the day: "A friendly smile makes you happy (the light of the eyes rejoices the heart, KJV) and good news makes you feel strong (a good report makes the bones fat." KJV)

In my ESL classrooms, I give the students a mirror so they can see their faces speak English. Our language is very facial, and some sounds can simply not be made accurately unless we smile. When speakers of other languages realize the importance of facial expressions in English, they fatigue easily when forming the sounds that are unfamiliar. Likewise, our smiles need exercise so that we easily make them part of our everyday countenances.

I often tell my students that there is a mile in our sMILEs—a mile of joy, happiness, good will, and yes, even sunshine in each smile. There are many languages in this world, but a smile speaks them all!

Someone has written these words in a lovely poem:

"Among the world's expensive things
A smile is very cheap
And when you give a smile away
You get one back to keep."

I may speak in different languages, whether human or even of angels. But if I don't have love, I am only a noisy bell or a ringing cymbal. I may have the gift of prophecy, I may understand all secrets and know everything there is to know, and I may have faith so great that I can move mountains. But even with all this, if I don't have love, I am nothing. I may give away everything I have to help others, and I may even give my body as an offering to be burned. But I gain nothing by doing all this if I don't have love. 1 Corinthians 13:1-3 (Easy-to-Read Version)

The English dictionary defines love as: tender affection, desire for somebody, passionate attraction and desire, very strong affection and a romantic affair. But the most important definition of love is GOD's definition.

The Daughters recently studied the Book of 1 Corinthians. In chapter 13, Paul talks about our gifts and gives his description of the greatest gift, "LOVE." One of the lessons in the study was titled, "LOVE OF CHRIST -- The Most Excellent Way." The writer of this lesson states that LOVE is perhaps the most abused word in the English language. Instead of communicating unselfish caring, it often expresses enlightened self-interest, manipulative affection or sheer lust.

LOVE is an action word. God loves us so much that He sacrificed His only SON's life, so that we might have everlasting life. (John 3:16.) The love we have for one another, or say we have, will never equal the LOVE God had for us. Jesus' life was a perfect example of how we should love. In Matthew 22:34-40, Jesus teaches that the greatest commandments are focused on love for God and love for others. When we love God and others we are fulfilling God's two greatest commandments. Jesus even told us to Love our enemies and do good to them. We all know this is not an easy task, but there are benefits in doing so. (Luke 6:35.)

The Bible is filled with examples of love. We can truly show God how much we love Him by obeying His teachings. (John 14:23.) In 1 Corinthians 13: 4-8, His Words instructs us on love.

- Love never gives up.
- Love cares more for others than for self.
- Love doesn't want what it doesn't have.
- Love doesn't have a swelled head,
- Love doesn't force itself on others.
- Love isn't always "me first,"
- Love doesn't fly off the handle,
- Love doesn't keep score of the sins of others,
- Love trusts God always,
- Love always looks for the best,
- Love never looks back, but keeps going to the end.
- Love never fails.
- JESUS IS LOVE.

A Study of the Holy Spirit "THE DIETY OF THE HOLY SPIRIT"

A close study of scripture reveals three ages or dispensations, in which one Person of the Godhead is prominent. In the Old Testament it is God the Father, working **for us**. In the gospels it is God the Son, working **with us**. In the Acts and the Epistles it is God the Holy Spirit working **in us**. There is a progression in the reconciliation of man back to God, which only God himself could accomplish. The Holy Spirit is the last step in the process of reconciliation. Why, because he was active in/at the first step (Gen. 1:1-2; 2:7).

It is difficult to define *personality* when used of the Divine Being. God cannot be measured by human standards. God was not made in the image of man, but man in the image of God. In other words God is not a deified man. Only God has a perfect personality. Yet, when one possesses the attributes, properties and qualities of God (Omnipotence, Omniscience, Omnipresence), then divine personality may be unquestionably predicated to such a being. Does the Holy Spirit possess such properties? Let us see.

First Omnipotence, only God can do all things and is all powerful (Rev.19:6). Christ himself cast out demons by the power of the Spirit of God (Matt. 12:28). The creative power of God (Man can make, only God can create) is attributed to the Holy Spirit (Ps. 33:6; 104:30) – created man (Job. 33:4). Joseph was informed that Mary's child would be conceived by the Holy Spirit (Matt. 1:18-20).

Second Omniscience, all that pertains to God and is revealed to us is done so by the Holy Spirit (1st Cor. 2:6-12). Only God can know the end from the beginning or possess the knowledge of something before it happens. That the Holy Spirit has this foreknowledge is seen in Peter's statement concerning Judas in Acts 1:16 and Paul's statement in 1st Timothy 4:1.

Third Omnipresence, the ability to be everywhere at the same time is an attribute that only God has (Note: Satan does not have any of God's attributes) and God alone. Nevertheless, the Holy Spirit has this attribute. First and foremost to prove this, the Holy Spirit is in all believers everywhere at the same time. But, it is David and Paul that states it so clearly in Psalm 139:7-10; and Hebrews 9:14.

These attributes which are so conspicuous to God alone leaves no doubt in my mind that the Holy Spirit is God. Further evidence of the equality and sameness of God the Father and God the Holy Spirit can be found in the name 'Holy Spirit". The description "Holy" signifies the absolute separateness and distinction of the Holy Spirit from all other spirits (and there are others) from all that is creaturely and worldly. "Holy" is thus essentially the equivalent of that which is divine, for only God is Holy, thus identifying the Holy Spirit as God. Finally, God has revealed Himself as Father and Creator, as Son and Savior, and as Holy Spirit and Comforter. As Paul told Timothy in 1st Timothy 3:16 "And without controversy great is the mystery of godliness: God was manifest in the flesh, justified in the Spirit, seen of angels, preached unto the Gentiles, believed on in the world, received up into glory."

A Study of the Holy Spirit THE PERSONALITY OF THE HOLY SPIRIT

The Scriptures do not stop to prove the Spirit's reality, but plainly state the fact. Yet, often time we are guilty, either from ignorance or thoughtlessness, of applying the neuter pronoun "It" to the Holy Spirit. We say "It" as if the Holy Spirit is some sort of divine dynamic energy, impregnated with spiritual or supernatural life or power, which passes through the human nervous system animating and controlling it at specific time in worship.

It seems strange that it should be necessary to discuss this subject at all. Indeed, in the light of the last discourse of the Master (<u>John 14-16</u>), it seems superfluous, if not really insulting. During all the ages of the Christian era, however, it has been necessary to emphasize the doctrine of the Holy Spirit.

Some may ask why it is necessary to study the personality of the Holy Spirit. Or, can we say accurately that the Holy Spirit has a personality. As Contrasted with the Other Persons of the Godhead, the Holy Spirit Seems Impersonal. The visible creation makes the personality of God the Father somewhat easy to conceive; the incarnation makes it almost, if not altogether, impossible to disbelieve in the personality of Jesus Christ; but the acts and workings of the Holy Spirit are so seemly secret and mystical, that we are prone to think of Him as an energy, a power, a manifestation or influence of the Divine nature, an agent rather than a Person.

Because of the names given to the Holy Spirit; *breath*, *wind*, *power*. And the symbols used in speaking of the Spirit; *oil*, *fire*, *water*, etc. (John 3:5-8; Acts 2:1-4; John 20:22; 1 John 2:20). It is not strange that in view of all this some students of the Scriptures may have been led to believe, erroneously of course, that the Holy Spirit is an impersonal influence emanating from God the Father.

Yet, the Holy Spirit is an essential part and player of Divine Revelation and Illumination. Seeing that the Bible is divinely inspired (2 Tim 3:16), the Holy Spirit is its author. The Holy Spirit is the direct agent between heaven and earth in this gospel age. The Holy Spirit has been given the sacred task of applying redemption to believing sinners, convicting us of our sin, regenerating, sanctifying, teaching, guiding and inspiring us. We are, or should be, totally dependent upon Him for all that concerns our life in Christ here on earth.

The Holy Spirit is the administrator of the Church's affairs. The book of Acts which deals with the internal operations and external obligations of the Church strongly emphasized the work of the Holy Spirit in the first century Church. If churches today were more controlled by the Holy Spirit as in apostolic days, I believe their life, work, communities which they are in, and the individuals which are in them would be entirely revolutionized. But, imperfect views of the authority and person of the Holy Spirit and our unwillingness to surrender to that authority and person, have lead to spiritual

dryness, low levels of Christian life, formalism in worship, failure to fulfill the mission, and lack of discipline in the Church.

The importance of the personality of the Spirit, and of our being assured of this fact is forcibly set forth by Dr. R. A. Torrey he says: "If the Holy Spirit is a Divine Person and we know it not, we are robbing a Divine Being of the love and adoration which are His due. It is of the highest practical importance whether the Holy Spirit is a power that we, in our ignorance and weakness, are somehow to get hold of and use, or whether the Holy Spirit is a personal Being who is to get hold of us and use us. It is of the highest experimental importance. Many can testify to the blessing that came into their lives when they came to know the Holy Spirit, not merely as a gracious influence but as an ever-present, comforter, loving friend and helper."

We will continue our study of **THE PERSONALITY OF THE HOLY SPIRIT** next month. I pray that this feeble attempt is a help to you.

The Need for Unity in the Church

The Holy Scripture is adequately stocked with passages instructing us on how and commanding us to, have unity within "THE CHURCH". When I speak of "THE CHURCH" I am speaking of the Body of Christ (the organism), when I speak of the church I am talking about the organized body of believers (the local church). Yet, both are commanded to be in unity, because one, the local church is to be a direct reflection of the other, THE CHURCH. However can we, without reservation honestly say that the organization is a physical manifestation and/or gives evidence of the organism? I sadly must say that we cannot.

There is sorrowfully an ever growing distinction and dissimilarity between the two. And, I am suggesting that because of this, the latter (the organization) has lost its influence, potency and credibility in our local communities, and this world as a whole, steaming from our lack of UNITY.

To understand the subject of UNITY clearly one needs to comprehend the biblical meaning of the word UNITY. The Hebrew word for UNITY is *yāḥad* in its verb form and *yaḥad* which is the noun derived from *yāḥad*. The word means "together; alike; all at once; all together." *Yaḥad* appears about 46 times and in all periods of biblical Hebrew. Used as an adverb, the word emphasizes a plurality in unity. In some contexts the connotation is on community in action. Goliath challenged the Israelites, saying: "I defy the armies of Israel this day; give me a man that we may fight together" (1 Sam. 17:10). In other places it, too, is synonymous with the word *kullām*, which means "altogether." The Greek is *henotēs* it is a rare noun signifying the "unity" of the Spirit (Eph. 4:3), and the "unity" of the faith (Eph. 4:13). In both contexts, such a unity, embracing the peace and knowledge of God, is affirmed as a goal to which all believers should aspire within the community of God's people. In its adjectival form the meaning is "harmonious", "being of one mind." It is found in 1 Pet. 3:8 as an exhortation: "Live in unity (i.e., be at peace) with one another.

If we look at these word in the original languages, four concepts jump out at us; 1) together, 2) all at once, 3) being of one mind, faith and spirit and 4) community in harmonious action. In his garden prayer (John 17) Jesus prayed for three things: Himself, His Disciples, and Future Believers. If you examine the 20th thru 26th verse of that text Jesus' first request is that we be in UNITY just as He and the Father are. To me this statement specifies that the organization needs to reflect the organism in every aspect. Those characteristics' are unity in God's Will as expressed in Ephesians 4:1-6, in God's way as spoken in Philippians 2:2, and in God's word Galatians 3:26-28.

Until we as Christians, not Protestant, Apostolic, or Catholic, black, white...etc, learn that we are sheep in different folds (John10:16), we will always fall short. I pray that we learn not to focus on our differences, but on the common salvation we received through Jesus "The" Christ. Putting aside past and present hurts and pains to do the will of Him that sent us.

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A Study of the Holy Spirit THE PERSONALITY OF THE HOLY SPIRIT-2

The term personality is defined as the quality or fact that defines a particular person having habitual patterns and qualities of behavior as expressed by physical and mental activities and attitudes distinct to that individual. Based upon this definition the Holy Spirit has a personality, there is no one else like Him. The names given to and used to describe the Holy Spirit imply personality. Names such as: *The Comforter:* John 14:16; 16:7. "Comforter" means one who is called to your side—as a client calls a lawyer. That this name cannot be used of any abstract, impersonal influence is clear from the fact that in 1 John 2:1 the same word is used of Christ. (See Rom. 8:26). Again in John 14:16 the Holy Spirit, as the Paraclete, is to take the place of a person—Christ Himself, and to personally guide the disciples just as Jesus had been doing. No one but a person can take the place of a person.

Christ, in speaking of the Spirit as the Comforter, uses the masculine definite article, and thus, by His choice of gender, teaches the personality of the Holy Spirit. There can be no parity between a person and an influence or energy. The Holy Spirit is represented as searching the deepest and profoundest truths of God, and possessing knowledge of His counsels sufficiently to understand His purposes (1 Cor. 2:10, 11). Could a mere influence do this? The Spirit is said to have a *mind*, and that implies thought, purpose, determination: Rom. 8:27, cf. v. 7. Mind is an attribute of personality. Personal Acts are ascribed to the Holy Spirit: The Holy Spirit *speaks*: Rev. 2:7 (cf. Matt. 17:5—"Hear ye him.") It is the Spirit who speaks through the apostles (10:20). Speech is an attribute of personality. The Spirit *maketh intercession*: Rom. 8:26 (R. V.), cf. Heb. 7:25; I John 2:1, 2, where Christ is said to "make intercession.

In Acts 13:2; 16:6, 7; 20:28 the Holy Spirit is seen *calling* missionaries, *overseeing* the church, and *commanding* the life and practice of the apostles and the whole church. Such acts indicate personality.

The Holy Spirit is Susceptible to Personal Treatment and emotion. He may be *grieved* (Eph. 4:30); *insulted* (Heb. 10.29); *lied to* (Acts 5:3); blasphemed and sinned against (Matt. 12:31, 32). Indeed, the sin against the Holy Spirit is a much more grievous matter than the sin against the Son of Man. Can such be said of an influence or engery? Can it be said even of any of the sons of men? He can be *vexed* Isaiah 63:10; He can be resisted Acts 7:51.

Spiritual gifts are distributed to believers according to the *will* of the Spirit (<u>1 Cor. 12</u>). Here we find wisdom, prudence and discretion, all of which are distinguishing marks of personality. The Spirit not only bestows spiritual gifts, but bestows them discreetly, according as He thinks best.

With just this information alone (the Bible has so much more) we must realize and act accordingly to the fact that our fellowship with the Holy Spirit is not with a 'something' but with a 'somebody'; not with a force, a energy, or an influence, although the Holy Spirit can do all of that, but with 'Him'.

Once the truth of the Holy Spirit's personality and work are realized, there opens up to us a life of blessedness and power, it has been said a individual is known by the company he keeps, let us reflex that!

We will next study the Deity of the Holy Spirit.

"The Devil Made Me Do It"

The Flip Wilson Variety Show was popular during the early to mid seventies. Geraldine was one of the characters made famous by Mr. Wilson. Whenever Geraldine did something she knew was wrong, she would say, "The Devil made me do it." Soon everyone began using that line to excuse their bad behavior. Though that saying became famous due to Geraldine, laying the blame on the devil did not originate with Mr. Wilson. It began thousands of years ago in the Garden of Eden. Remember Eve blamed the serpent for her act of disobedience (Genesis 3:13). Thousands of years later, some are still unwilling to take responsibility for their actions, and in essence are saying, "The Devil Made Me do it."

James 1:13-15 (Amplified) reads as follows, "Let no one say when he is tempted, I am tempted from God; for God is incapable of being tempted by [what is] evil and He Himself tempts no one. But every person is tempted when he is drawn away, enticed and baited by his own evil desire (lust, passions). Then the evil desire, when it has conceived, gives birth to sin, and sin, when it is fully matured, brings forth death."

God's Word is clear; we are tempted by our own lustful desires. Yes, Satan can and does plant evil thoughts/suggestions into our minds, but he is powerless to make us act upon them. We must take responsibility for our own actions. Placing the blame on something or someone else does not help us to mature. Though sometimes painful, it is important to be honest with ourselves about ourselves.

In the Garden of Eden both Adam and Eve began finger pointing, but God confronted all of them. He confronted Adam first since he knowingly disobeyed God's command. He was given clear instructions that he chose to ignore. Then God confronted Eve for inviting Adam to join in her disobedience. God also confronted the serpent for enticing them. Though they were enticed, the serpent did not make them eat. Therefore, each of them suffered the consequences of their actions.

Since we were all born with a sinful nature, it is necessary for us to receive the new birth in order to overcome our evil tendencies. Even after conversion, we still have to resist the urge to satisfy our lustful appetites. We always will be faced with some form of temptation in this life, but God has placed within us the power to resist. We can be overcomers with the help of the Holy Spirit residing in us.

When faced with temptation, we have a choice: Either we will obey God or we won't. The choice is ours, and God will hold us accountable for the choices we make. James tells us to submit to God, resist the devil and he (devil) will flee. God is just, and would not ask us to do what we are incapable of doing. Therefore, we will not be able to point the finger or place blame on any one else by saying "The Devil made me do it."

"The Source of My Strength"

I have been holding on to the book of Philippians, all four chapters, for over a year. The book has been a source of strength and encouragement for me and I would like to share it with you.

As Christians we forget that we are connected to this unlimited power source -- Jesus the Christ. Philippians 4:13 says, "I can do all things through Christ which strengtheneth me." (KJV.) That is my proclamation, "I can," not because I am strong, but because I am holding on to Jesus the source of my strength.

So when my account is in the negative, and when I am afraid or alone, I can. On the days when every thing that can go wrong, goes wrong and I feel as if two concrete blocks are tied to my legs, I can. When all I want to do is cover my head and stay in bed, I can. I turn to Paul's book Philippians where he is constantly saying "Rejoice in the Lord." (Philippians 2:16, 3:1, 3:3, 4:4 and 4:10.)

In my weakness I ask, "How can I rejoice when my world is falling apart around me?" You see, that liar, the devil, told me that I need to always be in control. That is the lie. It is the lie we try to live and we fail at because we are leaning on our own strength. Depending on our own strength causes uncertainty and fear. If we allow ourselves to live in a state of constant fear and heightened worry we have already lost the battle as a Christian. But, when we rejoice in the Lord in spite of our situations, we throw the devil a curve ball.

As Christians we have power. Our power comes through our faith. Our faith allows us to believe, "Yes! I can do all things through Christ which is my strength." I have strength that allows me to "press toward the mark for the prize of the high calling of God in Christ Jesus." (Philippians 3:14.) JESUS' name is above all names and at His name every knee should bow. (Philippians 2:10.) I have learned to say Paul's words, "For me to live is Christ. . . ." (Philippians 1:21.) I know that I would have lost my mind, or be dead by now, if I was not leaning and depending on the strength of Jesus. I could not have made it this far without Jesus.

We must let go of all the stuff in our lives that we think we are controlling -- but really the stuff is controlling us. We have to get out from under the covers and into the light. We must get up, dust ourselves off, and press forward believing that we can do all things through CHRIST our strength. I can. You can. We can. God Bless You.
